More Truth and Light

"May your kingdom come. May your will be done on earth as it is in heaven." Matthew 6:10

What an inspiring and enriching experience it was to attend "Into the Deep" at General Synod 35 in Kansas City, MO. In the July newsletter I shared with you in this space, the work that was before the delegates to General Synod 35. Besides seeing old friends, meeting new ones, inspiring worship, learning about the United Church of Christ and all its ministries, or marching against the actions of ICE in the Kansas City, important work was also done that will impact our life together. I thought I would share some of the good work we've done and the powerful witness and impact the United Church of Christ continues to have in our nation, the world, and among our ecumenical partners.

If I were to summarize the work of General Synod 35, I would say that our work from July 11th through the 15th was the continuing effort of God's people faithfully living into the petition of the Lord's prayer that I've cited above. The United Church of Christ and our Ecumenical partners around the world continue to create a world where God's realm is as present on earth as it is in heaven. Through resolutions and decisions, the United Church of Christ continues to be a leader in making important decision that reflect justice, equity, peace, and inclusion. Let me share how we've continued to do this with the decisions we have made.

At this meeting, the delegates elected Rev. Shari Prestemon, Associate General Minister & Co-Executive of Global Ministries. We celebrated our partnership with the United Church of Canada and the United Church of Christ of the Philippines. In addition, the United Church of Christ entered full communion with Iglesia Evangelica Unida De Puerto Rico (IEUPR) and Evangelische Kirche in Deutschland (EKD). Through the election of Rev. Shari Prestemon, the votes to grant both IEUPR and EKD full communion with the United Church of Christ, we continue to make relevant the prayer of Jesus the imagines a time that 'all may be one'.

In addition to affirming our partners in ministry and mission, the United Church of Christ passed several significant resolutions. By a unanimous vote of General Synod, the four separate Pennsylvania Conferences combined to create the Keystone Conference. In addition, we passed a resolution recognizing that the State of Israel is engaged in genocide and General Synod agreed. We also declared that President's Trumps policies and actions are acts of domestic terrorism by our own elected government and we stand against his policies with multiple

agencies and Christian denominations who believe the same. We passed a resolution speaking against the government of India that is engaged in active segregation toward Muslims, Christians, and other minority religions. The current government of India is moving toward a theocracy of Hinduism and persecuting all other religious people. General Synod declared the action of the Indian government as immoral and a violation of international human rights.

In addition, the United Church of Christ called for the support of full funding and autonomy for the Voice of America and voted in support of the restoration of full funding for the United States Agency for International Development (USAID). These resolutions and others are our best effort this year in trying to live into the vision of doing good on earth as has been done in heaven.

In addition to resolutions of witness, we also elected officers to serve the United Church of Christ in the 'in between time' of our, now, triennial meetings. We passed amendments for the Constitution and Bylaw that reflect our decision to move from biennial meetings to our triennial meetings. The General Synod delegates rejected an amendment that would cede the oversight and election of our three Associate General Ministers to the General Minster and President of the United Church of Christ and the Board of Directors. After robust debate the delegates of the General Synod defeated the amendment to the Constitution of the United Church of Christ.

As always, it is an honor and privilege to serve as a delegate to General Synod, and I am always grateful for the opportunity. More than resolutions, pronouncements, and elections, General Synod is our Church in action and a wonderful opportunity to experience holy, sacred community with UCC members and mission partners from around the world. Indeed, for five days, it felt that God's realm was on earth as it was in heaven. Let me conclude with the Lord's Prayer from the Celtic Christian tradition rendered by Rev. John Philip Newell:

Holy One beyond all names
Eternal Wellspring
May love rise again in us today
With food for every table,
Shelter for every family
And reverence for every life.
Forgive us our failings in love
And free us from all falseness
That the light of our souls may shine
And the strength of our spirits endure
For Earth and all its people
This day, tonight and forever. Amen.

The following sermon was preached on Sunday, July 6th and several members requested that the sermon be included in the August newsletter. The sermon is printed below, and I pray that for those who were unable to worship on this day, that you will find strength and inspiration in this interpretation of the passage from Galatians.

The Fourth Sunday after Pentecost July 6, 2025 Galatians 6:7-10 "Edging out the Darkness with the Light of Christ"

Two-Hundred and Forty-Nine years ago 56 undocumented immigrants, asylum seekers, and refugees signed the Declaration of Independence and created what would become the United States of America. My curious mind wonders what that must have been like for the people of this new nation. I'm imagining the sun rising and slowly shedding its light upon a tired and weary people — a people who had been fighting for justice, freedom, and happiness for a long time. Fifty-six undocumented immigrants, asylum seekers, and refugees signed the Declaration of Independence and invited friends and strangers to voluntarily join them in this new experiment — an experiment where there would be no king, no ruling class, and no authoritarian strongman who would govern by intimidation, hateful threats, persistent bullying, or abusing the privileges of an elected office.

I wonder how the men and women in 1776 must have felt when they heard the words, "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men [sic] are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator, with certain unalienable right, that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." I would imagine that these spoken words were, to the people, like the light of freedom edging out the darkness of despair - a torch lighting the way beside the golden door of this new nation. And to imagine that these words were signed by fifty-six undocumented immigrants, asylum seekers, and refugees who did not fear the king, did not grow weary in their pursuit of freedom and happiness, and even under the threat of death, persevered and initiated a sequence of events in our American history that we are celebrating this weekend – two-hundred and forty-nine years later. Against the deep darkness of the earth, a fireworks display reminds us of the light of freedom that every human spirit longs to know and wish that they could have. Yet, even in a land that prides itself in freedom, we still have too many who are not free. Through mindless executive orders, heartless legislation, and a terrible abuse of power, the United States, today, is denying God's beloved children the very values that shaped our nation. "... life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness..." In our nation today, there is such deep concern for our nation that not even a bright, fantastic drone assisted firework display can edge out the darkness that we are feeling, nor does it fill our hearts with pride. In such a time as this, the words from Paul ring loud, clear, and are convicting to me. His call to me and to all who follow the light of Christ is one that asks of us not to despair, but to, instead, embrace the moment and be the light of Christ that edges out the evil, the grief, and the darkness that surrounds us. Paul writes, "So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up." Galatians 6:9.

When Paul penned these words for his church in Galatia, outside voices were calling the believers to turn to a differ-

ent gospel and one that Paul had not been teaching. At this point in his ministry, Paul was not a compliant patriot of Rome. He was not interested in national propaganda that laid the mantle of God upon the Roman Emperor. At this point in biblical history, the Jewish religion was propping up the Roman Empire and the Sadducees, Priests, and Pharisees were the religious broadcasting station for the empire. Paul could see how the political leaders and religious leaders of the time were exploiting one another for their own political, social, and economic gain. The actions of the religious leaders of the time were undermining the message of Christ with a gospel that dehumanizes God's beloved ones. The message that was being heard and taught in religious settings was contrary to the teachings of Jesus Christ that we embrace. In Galatia and in the region known as Asia Minor, the outside voices, calling believers to turn to a different gospel were ones that measured success in dollars and cents, believed that self-worth must be merit based, each person was nothing more than a transaction to complete a service, and it believed in a two-tiered society, the wealthy few and everyone else. In this context Paul teaches his people about doing the right thing – to stand in the light of Christ. He reminds his congregation that you 'reap what you sow.' "If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh, but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit." Galatians 6:8. The context of Paul's world was not unlike what we are witnessing today. We are hearing outside voices that are not Christian in the least and are not faithful to the teachings of Jesus Christ. Paul's words to his church in Galatia are words we need to hear today. If we are going to edge out the darkness with the light of Christ. Our message must be clear. It must be a message of inclusion and justice, and our mode of operation is not to destroy God's Realm but to build up God's realm. "If you sow by the flesh, you will reap corruption. If you sow by the Spirit, you will reap the goodness of Spirit God. We must believe in the values that shaped the Declaration of Independence. Once we reclaim these values that are lost in our nation and the world today, we can once again live in a nation, a world where every soul is valued, every dream is realized, and every tree, flower, or animal is a special gift from God to us that demands the same kind of love and care that God gave each one of them on their birthing day. All that we have known in recent memory is a call to Christian action that must work faithfully and diligently to edge out the darkness that is all around us today.

I once heard some words that lifted my spirit, they made me proud to be an American, and they provided a vision for an America that I could believe in. If your ears can hear, I'd like to share the words that give me pride and joy. Beyond pride and joy, these words give me hope in my world, my context today. Listen and be inspired. "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, The wretched refuse of your teeming shore. Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me, I lift my lamp beside the golden door! I think you've heard or read these words before. What are they telling you now? 'Let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up." Words I need to hear on this holiday weekend, and I hope they help you too in such a time as this. Amen.
